Neighborhood Trunk or Treat

The idea is simple: invite other parents and neighbors to gather together (either in a cul-desac or nearby parking lot), and turn the trunk of your car into a fall festival mini game booth. Kids have fun playing the game and getting some Halloween candy.

BOO Your Neighbors


This is a fun way to spread cheer and involve your kids every step of the way. Booing is a fun Halloween tradition where you secretly place a gift on your neighbors' porch for them to find, along with a note telling them they have been "Booed." Here's how it works: Pick up Halloween gift bags or buckets and the kids fill them up with treats, stickers, coloring books, temporary tattoos, bubbles, books, Dracula teeth, glow sticks, etc...along with an anonymous note telling your neighbor they've been "booed" and instructions for how to pass it on. Have your kids leave the bag of treats on the doorstep, ring the doorbell and run!

Decoration Contest

Who doesn't love a little competition from time to time? If your neighborhood gets into the spirit of Halloween, hosting a decoration contest could up the stakes a bit. Create ballots for the "most spooky," "most creative," "best candy" and "best decorated" houses. Hand them out to your neighbors and have everyone vote for the winners.

Block Party Appetizer Happy Hour

Hand out flyers to your neighbors, or post at a community mailbox, and invite everyone to participate in a potluck appetizer party before the trick or treating begins. Plan the potluck for an hour or two before dark, stage the event in your garage or on your driveway, and invite everyone to bring folding chairs. After a bit of mingling, head out trick or treating together.



Costume Parade

Since you never know if the Halloween costumes will make it back in one piece, line up the kids before heading out trick-or-treating for a street parade. Nominate 1-2 children to be the line leaders and have all the other kids follow the leader past all the driveways on your street. Put on festive music and allow parents to get the perfect photo op of the little pumpkins before dark.

Host an Outdoor Halloween Movie

Depending on the ages of the kids in your neighborhood, you can host a movie night leading up the holiday. You can do this in the front yard, or on your garage door for all the neighbors. You will need a projection unity and a portable speaker. A great viewing option would be the *Peanuts: Great Pumpkin* movie. Get it on Amazon or Apple TV.
